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Carillon Communities creates an inspiring and supportive living and learning environment for first year students. Carillon promotes an environment where students develop a sense of belonging and trust to support their academic success and innovative thought. In Carillon, students consider their own interests and knowledge, and become more active agents in their own education.

Course Description

Welcome to Carillon Communities. The Carillon Studio is required of all Carillon Community students and will serve to introduce you to Carillon and the University of Maryland. The Studio curriculum is the result of collaboration among Letters and Sciences, the Office of Undergraduate Studies, and the Academy for Innovation & Entrepreneurship.

In this course, you will learn how to use creative problem solving and collaboration strategies. You will apply these strategies in a series of experiences and finally to two course projects: the 'Design Project" and "Design My Maryland."

Each week, you will meet for the Carillon Studio Section (1 hour and 30 minutes with a section of your community) and for Monday Community Sessions (1 hour sessions with the full Carillon Community).
